

Get Out of Here!

You task is to plan the best route to take you from your home to the safe evacuation point in the least amount of time. More than one route will allow you to safely arrive at your destination; however, you want to choose the fastest route. Each dot represents $\frac{1}{2}$ gallon of gasoline used and $\frac{1}{2}$ hour of time. Your vehicle starts with 10 gallons of gasoline. See the bottom of page 4 to check your answer.



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Grab-n-Go

Preparing to evacuate your home in times of an emergency is a stressful process. Some steps you take can improve the safety of your property and belongings, while others put them at greater risk. Here are some actions you can take to better secure your property.

- Bring things, such as lawn furniture, toys, garden supplies, and trash cans inside. They can become flying missiles in windstorms.
- · Avoid trimming tree branches if yard waste will not be collected prior to a storm hitting your area.
- Turn off the electricity and water to your home before you leave.
- Unless ordered to do so, leave natural gas on to your home.
- Turn off and properly store propane tanks if they are mobile.
- Look for potential hazards around the outside of your home, such as nuts and fruit on trees, antennas, and other objects that may become dislodge during a storm.
- Avoid leaving windows opened or cracked to equalize pressure differences in a storm.
- Move all valuables inside the home to a safe location that is away from windows or doors.
- Make a video recording of all of the rooms in your home for insurance purposes.
 Individually videotape expensive items, such as large screen televisions or jewelry that might be lost, damaged, or stolen.

If you are ever ordered to evacuate, do so as soon as possible. Time is of the essence in times of disaster. Remember, things can be replaced, but your life and the lives of your loved ones are the most important to protect. The following list provides guidance of what you should pack in case you only have minutes to evacuate before a disaster strikes.

- Medicine, prescriptions, eyeglasses, contact lenses, and other medical equipment
- · Water and snacks
- · Flashlight, batteries, radio, and first aid kit
- · Change of clothes for each person
- Bedding for each person
- · Car and home keys
- Important papers, including personal ID's, Social Security cards, insurance policies, birth and marriage certificates, stocks, bonds, wills, tax returns, credit cards, checkbook, and cash
- Paper map of the region
